Kathy Keler *“For me the loops represent energy flow between people, which often happens in unpredictable patterns.”*

Gerry Hendershot’s first reaction to the image:

I think that mental ambiguity may be what gives the strip its spiritual quality--it challenges normal perceptions. There is other symbolism in the strip. For instance, it looks like a 3-dimensional infinity sign. It also reminds me of the labyrinth in that it involves a journey in and a journey out. In the labyrinth this is a journey in to the center and a journey out to the world. On the strip it is a journey "under" and a journey "over."

Jean Stewart’s interpretation:

My response to the lovely image that Kathy Keler created for the sabbatical period is similar to Gerry Hendershot's in that I immediately thought of the infinity sign when I saw the loop--our connections inward and outward are without defined limits, a wonderful idea to me. The figures are facing inward, but leaning outward, another symbol of the inward and outward journey. The loop also looks like a link, linking us together in community, and like a Mobius strip, a concept of mystery and wonder.

Margee Iddings’ (our upcoming retreat leader and guest preacher on May 20th) interpretation:

Such a strip symbolizes the vital connection between the inner life of the mind and spirit with the outer life of service and community. It also symbolizes the strength that comes not just from a rectangular strip made into a circle, but the even stronger sense that is inherent in the simple twist of that circle.

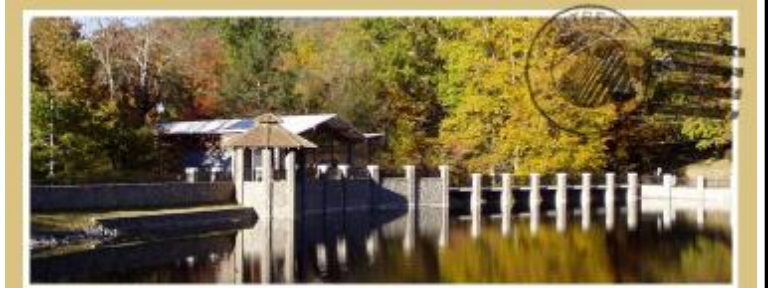

During "Dear My Friends" --Thanks to Pilgrims from Indonesia worship on

the Sundays of Advent 2006, Pilgrims made special offerings to four organizations, one of which was the *Reksa Putra Orphanage* in Indonesia, which was brought to Pilgrims' attention by Pilgrim Tari Gregory, a native Indonesian. The orphanage has separate facilities for boys and girls, and Pilgrims' gift was used to make much needed repairs to the boys' facility. Both boys and girls wrote thank you letters to Pilgrims and included pictures of themselves. All of the letters and photos will be on a bulletin board near the church office. Included here is a letter from Sekti Yani ("Yani"), who aspires to be, among other things, a novelist. (Yani is pictured giving the peace sign.)

Yudi, from the boy's facility, wrote: "Thank you for your kindness to me. By God's grace, through you, now my



house is pretty, clean, and neat. ... The new school year is almost here; please pray for me so that I can move on to the next higher class. May God bless our

friendship."

In a letter covering the children's thanks, the directors of the boys and girls facilities—Kriyono S. H. and Endang Isananto—wrote "Thank you for your love and care, and always for your prayers, because our children need the support for their upcoming final examinations. Hopefully, they are always fine and stay healthy so they can study well. Best wishes for the pilgrims and sisters and brothers in [your] Sunday School." ✚



A Pilgrim Story of Connections and Clarity

Throughout the sabbatical period, we will be hearing stories in worship, The Pilgrim and weekly Updates and Invitations email from Pilgrims based on our sabbatical themes of "connections and clarity." Each Pilgrim "storyteller" was given a reflection exercise to help name and articulate a story of connection and clarity from their experiences at church. This story of connections and clarity comes from Calva Leonard.

I first came to Pilgrims in 1969, and what comes to mind from those days is working with other young Pilgrims in staffing the Stone's Throw Coffee House, a ministry on Friday nights to the youth in the Dupont Circle Area - in those days there were a lot of runaways in the area. The other memory that strikes me from that time is sleeping in the hogans (something like wooden tents) and sitting around the campfire with the Whites and the Wolfs and our children at Camp Glenkirk, the Presbytery's former camp and conference center. I was away for about five years and then I came back to DC alone and it was to Pilgrims I came, where I had felt connected.

In my second life at Pilgrims, twenty years now, there are many personal connections made when we reach out to one another in love, some-

times to help, sometimes just to hug. And, over, around and through that, there is for me this umbrella of connection I feel with all other Pilgrims in the more intimate forms of worship - those times when we gather around the font or the table, when we pass communion one to the other, anoint one another, or wash hands at Maundy Thursday service. These times of experiencing worship as a community are transcendent.

I've been a Pilgrim for a long time and I know I feel connected to this place, but I never looked at it in quite this way before. As I went thru the reflection exercise that Ashley gave me, I was surprised at the length of the list I made without stopping to think, and surprised by the number of names on my list. Experiences and people just rolled out and I feel blessed to be a Pilgrim. †

Donald M. Terry, an active member of Pilgrims throughout the 1950's and 60's, died on January 21st, 2007 in Richmond, VA. He had spent the last 10 months of his life struggling to overcome multiple disabling conditions resulting from an auto accident last May in Danville, VA, where he and Harriet had settled in 2000 to be near their son.

Don arrived in Washington in 1951, having graduated from Cornell University, to work for the State Department (CIA employee of the cold War era were not permitted to use the words "CIA"). He began attending Young Adult activities at Pilgrims, and met his wife, Harriet Wilson, here. They were married by Dr. Bird in 1954, and added to our Sunday School not only a teacher but also three children: Sally, Russell, and Cynthia. Don served several terms as a deacon and was part of the "Fisherman's Club" (an early predecessor of today's "Theology on Tap"). The Terrys later moved their membership to Trinity Presbyterian near their home in Arlington. Don served as Trinity's treasurer for many years, and was also active in Meals on Wheels and other service projects.

A memorial service for Don was held at Trinity, with his daughter, Rev. Cynthia Terry, as one of the eulogists. She quoted from a prayer written by her father expressing his hope that you (family and friends) may experience the great joy of receiving God's gifts, ...seek knowledge and understanding of His will, and receive the love and power to carry (it) out". These words reflect the goals Don sought to reach throughout his life. †

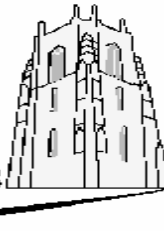
